


Busy People—The Willkie Way

At precisely 8:00 a.m., Monday, September 9, the two front doors of the Wendell Willkie High School were once again opened to 741 students, which was an increase over last year by 19. Almost every one of these 741, although not a one would admit it, had been anxiously awaiting this moment since 3:31 p.m., Friday, June 1,--three hot, humid, months ago.

Of this total there were 226 bright and shining freshmen who tried desperately to keep out of the path of any one of the 160 seniors who just happened to be around every corner, eager to greet them with a hardy, "Well look, another one."

The other 355 was made up of 166 juniors, who were not to be classified as upperclassmen, and 189 new sophomores who were no longer the little green freshmen. All were quite busy either trying to remember the combination to their locker, or if they did remember, cleaning out the mess which they just did not have time to do the last day of school. But the excitement of this year had just begun, for there were still 180 busy school days ahead of them.

This year, 1956-57, marks the Golden Anniversary of our school annual. Fifty years ago a volume entitled WIT AND WISDOM was printed for the graduating class of 1906. This little book, quite different from our modern, up-to-date CRESCENT, has set a pattern for the many yearbooks which have followed at Elwood High. Then, the school boasted only 283 students with a staff of 11 instructors, and there were 29 members in the graduating class--7 boys and 22 girls.

The book, which was about the size of a small note book, contained a joke, biography, poem, and prophecy about each graduating senior. The preface, labeled "Greeting", was addressed to OUR GENTLE READER. The seniors had class colors -- bottle

green and old gold--and a yell: "Waukeshaw, Kazoo, Kazan!

Hipety, Hipety, Hix!

Boomerang, Ch-wang Chi-ban! Rah for nineteen six!"

There were only a few pictures, but there were numerous advertisements in both the front and back of the book. The Opera House Drug Store, The Livery and Feed Stable, Lilly's Dye House, Records and Faust Clothing Store, and Hinshaw and Hughes City Drug Store were only a few of the business establishments advertising.

Fifty years ago Eva Hocker was the editor of the first annual, and now her niece, Linda Hocker, is the 1957 CRESCENT editor.




Just Before the Big Blast!!!


And Around The School





The motto of the Latin Club is "Ad astra per aspera" or "To the stars through difficulties."


Membership is offered to any student successfully completing one semester of Latin. The outstanding activity of the year was the initiation of new members held in February.



On Honor Day the members of the club are given special awards according to the number of points they have earned during the year.







The unusual fact about the Panthers this year is that there were nineteen seniors on the team--more than there has been for several years.




Our Mighty Panther Team






Facilities for Us

The Jinx Is Dead!


The 1956-57 basketball season will long be remembered in the history of Elwood as the year when the Panthers of Willkie High won their first sectional.


For forty-one years our ball teams had been attempting to earn the coveted sectional crown only to meet with defeat and disappointment. It was the common belief of most people that Elwood was jinxed and would never win the tournament at Anderson.

At last, on the second of March in 1957, the fierce determination of the team and the tremendous encouragement by the fans triumphed; Elwood won the sectional.

The fight had been long and hard. On Wednesday afternoon the Panthers downed the Madison Heights Pirates by a 65-60 score with guard Dave Henn and forward Tom Phillips accounting for over 40 of the Panthers' 65 points.

The Indians had defeated the Panthers by a 16 point margin December, 1956, in the holiday tourney, but the tables were turned this time. Elwoodled all the way, as the team was paced by Dick Mitchell and his 30 points, to a thrilling 67-53 win.


Elwood went wild! The moment the final gun went off the fans charged out on the floor in joyous, exuberant bedlam. Amidst cheers and hurrahs, the coach and team members were hoisted onto shoulders and paraded throughout the gymnasium.


Back in Elwood thousands flocked to the school grounds, waiting with eager anticipation to greet and congratulate the team. Horns blared and whistles blew long into the wee hours of the night.

The next two days were filled with activities in preperation for the forthcoming weekend. Store fronts were redecorated with red and blue, slogans adorned the window, and automobiles galore boasted streamers and signs to boost the Panthers to victory.


