




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


Summing Up Summer



















The 2000 Panther football team finished with a perfect 9-0 regular season and went 4-1 in the post season. The team finished the season ranked #1 in the coaches poll and #2 in the AP poll. The Panthers broke school records in points in a single game (78), points in a season (524), passing yards (2039), touchdown passes (20), and most wins in a row (12). The team's only loss came on November 10 against the Roncali Rebels in the team's first regional since the 1987 state runner-up team. The Panthers led the CIC in points scored and points allowed. They also led the Metro area in total offense and defense. Seniors Jason Murray and Clint Williams both broke school records. Clint broke the single season passing mark by throwing over 1,800 yards and 20 TD's, and Jason Murray now holds the record for interceptions with 24. Starters Jason Murray, Brent Borders, Justin Frye, Greg Durm, Clint Williams, Jason Smith, Nathan Richwine, Matt Abel were selected All-Area offensive and defensive players of the year.








































































