## NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

The National Honor Society is a nation-wide scholastic organization. It was first organized in our high school in 1944, and since that time it has been an incentive to students for greater attainments in high school.

A small number of students from the junior and senior classes are selected as probationary members. These students are chosen by a faculty committee from the upper fifteen per cent of their classes (according to their scholastic records) at the beginning of the fall semester. Member ship is based upon four qualities-character, leadership, service and scholarship. These probationary members are reconsidered near the beginning of each semester. Permanent membership is granted upon graduation from high school. Each year impressive, formal initiation services are held before the student body for those students who have been selected as permanent members of the National Honor Society. It is indeed an honor to be chosen as a lifetime member at the close of one's senior year.

The officers of the society are elected by the members at the organization meeting held early in the fall semester. Officers elected this year were: President, Nancy Heflin; Vice-President, Martha Dehner; Secre-tary-Treasurer, James Dickey.

## CRESCENT STAFF
